MUN SOCIETY ENROLLMENT AND TRAINING SESSION 2020

The Model United Nations Society successfully conducted the annual enrollment process and training session for over one hundred and twenty students over the course of fifteen days in the month of May. Teacher-in-charge, Ms Sonia Kapoor, along with the students of S7, worked their fingers to the bone, to sculpt a process that would allow them to engage with the students in the absence of physical communication owing to the prevailing conditions. The process, which under normal circumstances, would be spread out across multiple days, was effectively tailor made into a thirteen to fourteen hours comprehensive virtual training session, inculcating all facets of learning about International Politics, Jurisprudence and The United Nations.

A three-tier process was utilized to gauge the aspiring students' understanding of contemporary global events while also testing their ability to solve crises and articulately present arguments. The students were provided varying platforms to showcase their skills and express their opinions. These included, a written medium through analytical essays; a verbal and conversational medium through virtual group discussions and lastly, a collective - collaborative medium via the Online Training Session.

After having selected zealous students as new members of the society, the senior members of the society conducted a comprehensive online training session on May 30, 2020, which entailed explaining the fundamentals of the United Nations, along with the rules of procedure, research, debate and delegation for Model United Nations. To further broaden their horizon of knowledge, the MUN Society created a forum for a mock MUN simulation where each student assumed the role of a delegate, governed by the agenda "Countering the funding and flow of arms and ammunition to violent non-state actors with special emphasis on the Middle East". This session saw an overwhelming participation by one hundred and thirty four students, including eighty-five students from S4, thirty-six from S5, thirteen from S6 and ten from S7. The efforts of the organizing team under the guidance of the teacher-in-charge came to fruition on May 31, 2020, with eighty-five budding leaders and diplomats being successfully added to the MUN Society for the year 2020-2021.
