IRDSE WEBINAR: TEACHERS' VOICES ON IMPACT OF COVID 19 ON ONLINE SCHOOL EDUCATION IN DELHI

The Institute of Research and Development in School Education (IRDSE) organised a webinar titled "Teachers' Voices on Impact of COVID 19 on Online School Education in Delhi" on 18th June 2020 from 3:00 pm to 4:00 pm, under the guidance of Prof Marie Lall, Director (Research), IRDSE. The event was hosted by the Centre for Excellence, IRDSE, on the Zoom Android Application.

The webinar was attended by 200 academicians from all over the country, including Modern School teachers. It began with a welcome note by Prof Marie Lall. The moderator

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preparedness of the teachers also plays an important role. There exists a skill gap and the government needs to provide pedagogical digital preparedness to upskill the teachers.

Dr Samta Jain talked about her observations related to the online teaching skills and learning material appropriate for online education. Prima facie, the private school teachers have more training and access to online teaching, but lack of internet facility affects them badly. Dr Singh of Centre of Excellence suggested the concept of 'Community Schooling' for training of teachers for online teaching. Dr Monika Bisht of IRDSE provided insight on the impact of COVID-19 on higher education in India.

The participants posted their questions in the 'Chat' section during the presentation. Approximately forty questions were posted by the attendees. These included problems related to online teaching, such as assessment for learning, lack of visual and verbal connection with the learners, internet connectivity, online teaching material, practical work in sciences, migration of parents to native places and so on. These were answered satisfactorily by Dr Marie Lall, Dr Feroz Khan (IRDSE member), Dr Monica Bisht (IRDSE member), Dr Anviti Singh and Dr Samta Jain.

During the question-answer session, Dr Lall emphasized on giving training to the teachers for imparting knowledge and skills to the learners using computer network. As stated by her, online classes can't and shouldn't replace face to face teaching. It should only be used as a functional back-up during calamities like flood, earthquake and pollution. The pedagogy used should not be merely transferring the content to the students, instead, different ways of teaching should be adopted by the teachers. A discussion was held on restricting the screen exposure hours and ways of resolving mental health concerns of the learners. The webinar was a highly fruitful and enriching experience.

ASTRONOMY CLUB ONLINE SESSION

On 18th June 2020, the Astronomy Club of Modern School conducted an online session of Module 1 on the topic "Exploring the Universe", on the Microsoft Teams platform. The session began with a recapitulation of the modules held during the academic year 2019-20. The session was conducted by Mr Yogesh Kumar Joshi from SPACE (Space Technology and Education Private Limited) who discussed about the annular Solar Eclipse occurring on 21st June 2020. He also provided an insight into some interesting celestial phenomena like blue moon, pink moon and the strawberry moon. His power point presentation included the properties of various celestial bodies, the Goldilocks' zone and space missions like Apollo, Voyager 1 and Voyager 2. Keeping in tune with the current scenario, the importance of ozone layer in the atmosphere and its healing during the lockdown was explained to the students.

Another online session for students of Module 2 was held on 19th June 2020 on the topic "Stars and their Life Cycle". Experiences were shared by Bhavya Khanchandani (S3H), Tanishtha Manchanda (S3B) and Ayushman Gupta (S3D), who fondly recalled the hydraulic rocket launch and the overnight trip to Sariska.

Mr Yogesh started the session with a detailed discussion on the life cycle of a star.

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The students

curiously asked about the largest known star of the universe-UY Scuti. He gave an account of the famous red giant including stars Betelgeuse, Arcutrus and Anatre. The students were encouraged to locate and view the red giant Arcturus, usually visible in the northern hemisphere around 9 pm near the zenith. It was a great learning experience for the students.
